Congratulations to Our Fix-Up Grant Recipients!!!

This year we had TEN Homeowners and THREE Landlords receive Exterior Fix-Up Grants. The Centennial Community Improvement Association (CCIA) has been offering the Grants to Centennial and North Logan residents and landlords since 2013. The neighbourhood is starting to look better as more properties get exterior facelifts.

We asked one of this year's Homeowner Grant recipients, Kirsten Genaille, about the Grant and the work she got done. Kirsten has been part of the Centennial for a while and found out from a newsletter that the Centennial Community Improvement Association was offering Exterior Fix-Up Grants. Kirsten used the \$2500 grant to her advantage.

"My front gate needed repairs along with having my back porch/steps levelled and re-attached to the house and I also had the remaining area of my backyard fenced off for privacy and safety," she said.





But her project had some challenges. The CCIA needed the Grant applicants, both homeowners and landlords, to provide two quotes from qualified, registered contractors. if homeowners are not doing the work themselves. If they do the work without a contractor, materials and supplies are the costs that can be paid out. Sweat equity doesn't count. Landlords pay 50% of the project to the maximum of \$2500. Homeowners only contribute 10% so a \$2750 project results in a \$2500 Grant.

Kirsten says, "I had a contractor I had used in the past for the same kind of repairs and installation so I found it easier to obtain the services through him and explaining everything that needed to be done."

"We definitely feel safer when using our back steps/porch as they are now leveled," says Kirsten, "And we feel much safer being enclosed within our backyard."

The Exterior Fix-Up Grants a great way to get a project done.

When asked if she would recommend the Fix-Up Grants to her neighbours, Kirsten replied, "I most definitely would, I feel like this is one of the best things available to myself and the community. I would like to see more opportunities like this for the community, I feel it is greatly beneficial to maintain and upkeep houses in the neighborhood as it makes the neighbourhood appear sightlier and appealing."

The CCIA is already planning for next year's Exterior Fix-Up Grant PROGRAM. The information and applications will be out next spring.

The CCIA has created a listing of the qualified contractors that worked in the neighbourhood this year. It is available to anyone looking for a qualified contractor who is willing to work in the neighbourhood, with our residents to improve our houses.

With winter coming, there is a good chance that something can happen to the house. The CCIA can help. The CCIA Emergency Home Repair Grant can help homeowners who qualify to repair major damage like a roof, heating system or plumbing. We also have a Minimum Homeowner Repair Grant of up to \$3000 for homeowners who would have to leave their homes if the problem wasn't repaired.

We can also help if you have a disability, we can help you get a provincial grant to upgrade your property so you can stay home safely.


