onstruction on a three-storey, 47micro-suite apartment building is planned to begin this summer, with \$3.9 million toward the \$8-million development donated by Winnipeg's Pollard family via its Home First Winnipeg charity.

"Our family is very pleased to be developing this important resource for our community," said John Pollard, co-CEO of Pollard Banknote.

"We think that providing safe, secure housing on a housing-first philosophy is a critical step in improving the city for people who are at risk of homelessness."





The federal and provincial governments are teaming up with a prominent Winnipeg family to build housing for the homeless population in Winnipeg's Centennial neighbourhood.

The apartments, slated for construction at 390 Ross Ave., are intended to include a commercial kitchen, common dining area, living room, game room and TV area, as well as a room for Indigenous cultural activities. There will also be an outdoor patio and community garden, as well as staff on-site 24/7.

Manitoba Families Minister Rochelle Squires said 15 of the 47 units will be accessible for people with disabilities.

The provincial and federal governments are kicking in more than \$1.1 million toward the project, as part of the National Housing Strategy, and further funding is coming from a capital grant through Reaching Home: Canada's Homelessness Strategy, as well as a capital grant from the City of Winnipeg.

Although sobriety won't be a requirement for residents at the new complex, there will be supports on hand for those who want to recover from addictions.



CCIA 2021 COMMUNITY WALK AND TREASURE HUNT



Central Community Centre aka Freight House

he Central Community Centre is part of the Centennial neighbourhood, which is considered to be one of Winnipeg's oldest communities.

Built in 1903, our building was originally used to move train freight to and from warehouses, hence the nickname Freight House. In 1973,

Central Winnipeg Community Impact (CWCI) was established as part of a community initiative to add a space where families can come together.

Now proudly called the Central Community Centre, is a volunteer-run community club with a variety of activities such as bingos, food bank, arts and crafts and sports programs. Door #3 is where all of the sports and children's programming for ages 12 and under are held. There is also a full sized gymnasium that is open for rental for leagues, family sports, or individual use.

Over the winter of 2021/22, CCC hosted a Timbits Hockey team which played regularly in a league and tournaments. Team members attended several Manitoba Moose games. The team had in its ranks many newcomers to Canada and had their first experience with snow. Another successful program was indoor

soccer. Games were played at various locations and the players and coaches were shuttled by the CCC team bus.

Another popular program was wrestling by SCHEWA on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7pm to 9pm. The program is open to all ages and has free registration for area residents.

Boxing was a program that was slated to start over the winter with many sign ups but was unable to commence due to logistical issues but there are plans to continue it in the fall of 2022.

Currently, drop in volleyball and basketball sponsored by the Manitoba Aboriginal Sports and Recreation Council is available at Freight House. Computer club is also still active at Door 3.

Sign up for u11 boys and Coed 7-8 soccer will be held this spring. Please contact Yuri for more details.
